Introduction: How to Use This Book

Volumes 1 and 2 of the *Conversational Italian for Travelers Audio Dialogue Practice Book* are filled with useful phrases for the Italian student to read out loud. Essential Italian vocabulary and verb conjugation practice is provided with examples that can be used in real-life situations. The English translation is provided after each Italian phrase.

Audio for the Audio Dialogue practice books was recorded with native Italian and English speakers and is available for download from Amazon.com and your favorite audio platform.

In each chapter of the *Audio Dialogue Practice* book, short Italian phrases are first included as part of exercises that focus on Italian verb conjugation. This method adds interest to the verb drills and allows for easy memorization of both frequently used Italian verbs and conversational phrases. As the chapter progresses, the phrases build into complex sentences, using the vocabulary that has already been introduced. The more the example phrases are repeated, the more easily they are integrated into one's real-life Italian conversations and the more natural speaking in Italian becomes!

Both volumes of the *Audio Dialogue Practice* book are companion books to the textbook *Conversational Italian for Travelers*, in that all content in Chapter 1 of the audio book is covered in Chapter 1 of the textbook, and so on, for each of the 18 chapters of the textbook. The audio book provides Italian language practice that includes and then goes beyond the examples provided in the textbook to make conversational Italian truly come alive.

The focus of the textbook and the audiobook is on learning "all the Italian you need to know to enjoy your trip to Italy." The textbook *Conversational Italian for Travelers* is divided into three units: "Transportation," "City Life," and "At the Hotel and Restaurant." The Volume 1 *Conversational Italian for Travelers Audio Dialogue Practice Book* covers Chapters 1 through 9 of the textbook, which includes the entire "Transportation" and the first half of the "City Life" units, while Volume 2 covers Chapters 10 through 18, and includes the second half of "City Life" and the complete "At the Hotel and Restaurant" units.

In Volume 1, the *Audio Dialogue Practice Book* introduces the Italian language with essential material for rote beginners, starting with the basics of conversation with easy meeting and

greeting phrases and describing where one is from. There is much repetition in the first two chapters of the names of countries and nationalities, which use Italian words that are similar to English and are easily understood by English speakers. In this way, the Italian student uses easy-to-learn Italian words to focus on learning Italian masculine and feminine agreement and then ease into the more difficult concept of Italian verb conjugation. As the book progresses, additional vocabulary is gradually introduced — similar to the way we learn our native language as children.

As the Volume 1 *Audio Dialogue Practice Book* progresses from beginning into intermediate material, Italian phrases are introduced that are useful for traveling throughout Italy on the train, in a taxi, or in an automobile. How to count in Italian is covered gradually in each chapter, along with how to tell time, talk about train schedules, and make purchases in Italy. From Chapters 1 – 7, there is an emphasis on the present tense Italian verbs used in every-day situations, including exceptions in pronunciation. In Chapters 8 and 9, reflexive verbs and familiar commands are covered in the "City Life" chapters, so the Italian student can communicate feelings and actions with the friends they make in Italy.

The Volume 2 *Audio Dialogue Practice Book* covers material that is useful for the intermediate Italian student, including vocabulary that emphasizes social life and vacationing while in Italy; how to talk on the telephone, send an email, make reservations, and visit Italian restaurants and hotels is covered in detail. Verb practice includes describing likes/dislikes and speaking in the past, future, and conditional tenses.

Can the audio books be used without the *Conversational Italian for Travelers* textbook? For best results, it is recommended to read each chapter in the textbook first to understand the grammar behind the phrases in the audio books. The *Conversational Italian for Travelers* textbook was created specifically for adults who are motivated to learn Italian on their own. But for those Italian students who learn best by listening, whether learning on their own or in a formal Italian class, the audio material in both volumes of the *Audio Dialogue Practice* books can stand alone as an invaluable learning aid. The topics covered in each exercise are summarized in a brief introduction, both in the books and in the audio recordings. One can just listen, listen, listen, and repeat to start speaking Italian immediately! Listen to each phrase once, or over and over again — as much or as little is needed, and follow the pace that is best for you!
